



Cost of living and budgeting your money.

A guide on how much things cost, so you can budget for
your time as an international student in the UK.

How much money should I bring with me to the UK?

You will need to bring some money with you to cover your initial expenses. We do not recommend that you bring large amounts of cash. It can take from two to four weeks to open and use a UK bank account, so make sure you have ways to access money while you wait for your UK account to open.

The amount of money you will need to cover your initial expenses will depend on your accommodation situation. If you have already organised and made all of the appropriate payments for your accommodation, £400 should probably cover your initial expenses until you open a bank account. If you are looking for private accommodation, you will usually be required to pay a deposit and one or more month's rent in advance, so you will need to budget accordingly.

If you are planning to use a credit or debit card from your bank at home when you arrive in the UK, you should check before you leave if you can use it in the UK, and if there are any limits on the amount you can withdraw/pay per day. You should also check how much money you will be charged each time you use your card. The most common credit cards in the UK are Visa and MasterCard.



Budgeting

Here are a few things to consider when thinking about your budget:

- Bus fare
- Mobile phone top up/contract
- Home/content insurance
- Medical insurance
- Food
- Clothing
- Laundry
- Study equipment/course trips
- Going out
- Hobbies, music, etc
- Holidays/travel
- Presents/gifts
- Clubs and societies run by AUBSU (0-£50 each)

If you are not living in one of AUB's halls of residence you will also need to consider the following:

- Council Tax (applicable if you live with people who are not students)
- Water bills
- Gas bills
- Electricity bills
- TV Licence
- Landline telephone
- Internet connection

One-off costs

- Bedding (duvet, pillows, sheets, pillowcases) **£52**
- Laptop **from £230**
- Tablet **from £150**
- Television licence **£154.50 per year**
- Membership of a student society **£1 to £10**
- Gym membership (at University gym) **£99 per year**
- Kitchen equipment (plates, cutlery, pans) **£85**
- Insurance for personal belongings (in private accommodation) **£150 per year**

Private rented accommodation	£92 - £220	£420 - £1000	<p>Private rented accommodation tenancy agreements are usually 11-12 months, often bills aren't included in the rent costs.</p>
Bills (non-university accommodation)		£40 - £64	<p>Make sure you allow room in your budget for bills.</p> <p>Bills may include: electricity/gas, water, internet, TV license.</p>
Deposit (non-university accommodation)			<p>Deposit is a sum that a landlord can request at beginning of a tenancy as security against non-payment of rent or damage of property. This is usually equivalent of between one weeks rent or one months rent.</p>
Laundry		£20.80	<p>Prices of washing and drying in student accommodations and public laundromats vary.</p>
Toiletries and household/ everyday items		£10 - £20	<p>Remember that you might need to some budget for one-off items like bedding, towels, tableware, cooking utensils.</p>
